### Saturday, July 8

Pilgrim United Church of Christ 7:30 pm -- \$18 (\$15 members) Mike Mullens and Forest Sun

Mike and Forest have been collaborating since 2016, and it shows. Mike will kick off the concert, showing us some of his instrumental virtuosity, then will spend the bulk of the evening backing Forest on guitar, mandolin, and mandola.

Mike Mullins, San Francisco
Bay Area native and current
Los Angeles-area resident,
has been a fixture on the
West Coast acoustic music
scene for over forty years.
Well-known for his guitar work
with the Cache Valley Drifters
(Bill Griffin and Wally
Barnick), Mike is a highlyregarded instrumentalist and
songwriter and has appeared

on over 100 studio albums. In 2014. Mike released his first solo project, Windows of Time, a compendium of Americana styles showcasing a trove of original material over a twenty-five-year span. In addition to acclaim as a solo and ensemble artist. Mike is widely regarded as a top-tier mandolinist, and spent multiple summers as an artist-in-residence at the Annual Mandolin Symposium hosted by David Grisman and Mike Marshall. He was also a featured performer at the 2019 and 2021 Far West Folk Alliance Conferences. Mike's newest project, 8-String Sketches, a tour-deforce collection of solo mandolin pieces, was released in 2021 on David Grisman's Acoustic Oasis Records, and is currently enjoying wide United States and international roots and Americana radio airplay.

Forest Sun was born in upstate New York to folksinging back-to-the-land hippie parents. His dad used to chop wood with neighbor Garth Hudson of the Band and literally built the floor that Bob Dylan stood on at manager Albert Grossman's Bearsville studios in

Woodstock, New York.
Weaned on a diet of Jackson
Browne and Toots and the
Maytals, some of Forest's
earliest memories are of his
dad playing *Poncho and Lefty*by Townes Van Zandt and his
mom singing Elizabeth
Cotton's *Freight Train*.



With over 78 million plays on Pandora. Forest now enlivens audiences around the globe with his wealth of songs and stories, all sung and told in a laid-back California style. His soulful music draws on a deep well of Americana and is compared to everyone from Jack Johnson and The Avett Brothers to Van Morrison and Bob Dylan. He has played festivals from California (Strawberry Music Festival, American River Music Festival) to Europe (Belladrum in Scottland, Fiesta City in Belgium), opened for such luminaries as Lyle Lovett, Bonnie Rait, Steve Earle, Keb Mo, and toured with folks like Brett

Dennen, Mason Jennings, and the Beach Boys. Musical collaborations on his records include members of Bob Dylan's band, members of Calexico/Iron and Wine, Heather Massse (The Wailin' Jennys, Prairie Home Companion), Jolie Holland (The Be Good Tanyas), JT Nero (of Birds of Chicago), Sean Hayes, jam band ALO, and bluegrass band Hot Buttered Rum.

### Friday, July 21

Larry & Joe

Larry Bellorín & Joe Troop
were destined to make music
together. Larry hails from
Monagas, Venezuela and is a
legend of Llanera music. Joe
is from North Carolina and is a
GRAMMY-nominated
bluegrass and old-time
musician. Larry was forced
into exile and is an asylum
seeker in North Carolina. Joe,



after a decade in South
America, got stranded back in
his stomping grounds during
the pandemic. Larry works
construction to make ends
meet. Joe's acclaimed
"latingrass" band Che
Apalache was forced into
hiatus, and he shifted into
action working with asylum
seeking migrants.

Currently based in the Triangle of North Carolina, both men are versatile multiinstrumentalists and singersongwriters on a mission to show that music has no borders. As a duo they perform a fusion of Venezuelan and Appalachian folk music on harp, banjo, cuatro, fiddle, and whatever else they decide to throw in the van. The program they offer features a distinct blend of their musical inheritances and traditions, as well as storytelling about the ways that music and social movements coalesce.

### Saturday, August 5

Zzymzzy Quartet

The guys from the **Zzymzzy Quartet** have simple
ambitions: they just want to
play it like it was when it was
unamplified, melodic,
swinging, dreamy, full of sly
surprise. From the Prohibition
through the Second Big War,
the glory days of Louis

Armstrong and Duke Ellington are being recaptured humbly and with humor in San Diego by four musicians who know it don't mean a thing without that swing. They are **Beston Barnett** on guitar and vocals, **Matt Gill** on clarinet, **Paul Hormick** on upright bass, and **Pete Miesner** on guitar and lead vocals.

The Zzymzzy Quartet takes its name from a hypothetical "last word" in the dictionary: thus, their tagline, "The Last Word in Gypsy Swing." The "Gypsy" sound is heard in much of the guitar work, heavily influenced by the



stylings of French Gypsy jazz legend Django Reinhardt, but the group also pays tribute to the Swing Era with classic standards and idiomatic originals. Since the Zzymzzy Quartet came together in

2004, they've played dances, parties, weddings, festivals, art openings, and events throughout Southern California to unanimous enthusiasm. They have carved out a name for themselves as a tasty dance band and a classy addition to any wedding. In 2017, ART **HURTS** Records released their second CD. Petite Fleur which, on top of inspired playing and elegant arrangements, features cameos from a variety of beloved San Diego musicians.

Dear Darling

Dear Darling is a
Sacramento-based trio made
up of Natalie Hagwood on
cello and vocals, Casey
Lipka on bass and vocals,
and Hannah Jane Kile on
guitar and vocals. Together,
their joyous meld of jazz, folk,
classical, and pop delivers a
fresh new sound that is being
recognized both locally and
nationally.

Happenstance and the COVID lockdown brought the three "darlings" together in late 2019. Casey and Hannah immediately bonded after the two met while performing in the thriving Sacramento music scene. Natalie and Casey

joined forces after Casey hired Natalie sight unseen for a gig and realized the duo's undeniable chemistry. At Casey's suggestion, the three women met, and Dear Darling became a reality.

Dear Darling's uplifting vocal harmonics echo Joni Mitchell and the Laurel Canyon sound of the late 1960s. Augmented

with classical instrumentation fused with modern day messaging that encourages empowerment and inner strength, Dear Darling put a distinctively feminine spin on the Americana music form.

The accolades and milestones continued. The year 2022 began on an auspicious note with the release of Dear Darling's first album, *Believe*. Lush harmonies propel the title track that speaks to the importance of faith and self-love. *Always*, another

standout track, serves as a heartfelt lullaby professing a mother's enduring love for her child.

Dear Darling was selected to perform as one of three opening acts for the 14th annual Cayamo Sixth Man Soundcheck Festival, a seven-day Caribbean cruise featuring Americana artists

Emmy Lou Harris, Punch Brothers, the Indigo Girls, and Grace Potter. As the trio sing in their track Way Deep Down, "the seed will not grow if you keep it from the ground."

With angelic harmonies as billowy as clouds, and a reputation for live performances that continues to bloom, Dear Darling is firmly planted to move from critical "darlings" to mainstream audiences. And that's no small feat for a trio whose jazz-folk vision is unique to the contemporary music scene.

#### Friday, September 15

Templars Hall in Old Poway Park 7:30 pm -- \$18 (\$15 members) **Mari Black** 

Mari has played for us several times, and she has always wowed the crowd.

Called "one of the brightest fiddlers around today" (Brian O'Donovan, WGBH radio's *A Celtic Sojourn*), multi-style

violinist and champion fiddler Mari **Black** delights audiences around the world with her energetic playing, sparkling stage presence, and dazzlingly virtuosic fiddling. Mari's dynamic performances are infused with

her sense playfulness and deep love of the history behind the music, as she weaves together driving dance tunes with beloved stories that bring the music to life. Walk into any of her shows, and you're pretty much guaranteed to see people out of their seats and dancing in the aisles!

Mari's passion for dancedriven music extends far beyond the concert stage, as reflected in her work as a teacher, composer, dancer, competition judge, and musical ambassador committed to connecting people through music. Having earned her Doctorate in Education from Columbia University, Mari is a master teacher who is dedicated to helping students of all ages and levels explore the joy of making music.

Currently touring nationally with her trio, Mari's favorite thing to do is sweep audiences away on a spirited musical adventure featuring dance music from around the globe: Celtic. American, and

Canadian fiddling, jazz, tango, klezmer, folk, original works, and more!



### Saturday, September 30

Pilgrim United Church of Christ 7:30 pm -- \$18 (\$15 members) **Gadan** 

Gadan is a new project created by four experienced and well-known musicians in the Irish trad and European folk/rock scene. They come with years of experience touring the major European and United States traditional and alternative folk music festivals.

Their high-energy repertoire has a powerful live appeal and a sound comparable to new-trad acts such as Talisk, East Pointers, and WeBanjo3, but with a unique identity thanks to years of experience in several folk scenes, from Appalachian and old time to Scottish and Italian folk and traditional music.

Their lineup consists of two banjos (tenor and clawhammer), fiddle, mandolin, bouzouki, and guitar, creating an "stringsonly" sound with a hint of electronics, driven by a



powerful rhythmic pulse.
Gadan's performances build energy, taking audience to ecstasy with their wide spectrum of refreshing yet traditional sound.

Gadan consists of **Joan Gatti** on fiddle, **Lorenzo Testa** on tenor banjo and vocals, **Jacopo Ventura** on guitar and vocals, and **Andrea Verga** on five-string banjo, mandolin, and vocals.

The band ended its first United States tour in October 2022, playing in festivals and folk venues all along the East Coast, from Maine down to North Carolina, then New York and Boston. They are now back to cover the West. Gadan's power leaves no one unmoved. You don't need drums to groove.

Friday, October 6

Templars Hall in Old Poway Park 7:30 pm -- \$18 (\$15 members) **Sofia Talvik** 

Unmistakably Nordic in flavor, **Sofia Talvik** somehow still conforms to American interpretations of her own original music, a North Sea siren blending sparkle and melancholy. She is a veteran performer with seven full-length albums as well as numerous EPs, singles, and tours behind her.

Growing up in Sweden, her

music has always had a special tint of her Scandinavian heritage, making her a favorite among music lovers, but her



extended United States touring has moved her music closer to the Americana tradition. Adventures on the road stirred up a lot of emotions, both those of triumph and joy, but also those of self-doubt and defeat, all of which found their way into the songs of her 2015 album, *Big Sky Country*.

Living like a musical nomad, moving from place to place, slowly but steadily building her audience through her heartfelt and personal performances, she got to experience the United States in a way few people do. The people she met opened their homes and hearts to her and some of them even made it

> into her songs. But the album is not a diary from her tour. It is more of a storybook of emotions, new and old, in which everyone can find their own place.

Sofia's debut album, Blue Moon, was released in 2005 to much critical acclaim. Street of Dreams, followed in 2007, and it features a duet with indie pop icon Bernard Butler from British band Suede, released on her

then newly-formed record label Makaki Music.
Continuing a steady pace of recording, Sofia released her album, *Jonestown*, named after the tragic 1978 event in Jonestown, Guyana, in 2008, and was the first Swedish female artist to play the Lollapalooza festival in Chicago, that same year.

Sofia has toured several times since her first success at the Lollapalooza festival and has been invited to officially showcase at SXSW as well as at The Folk Alliance International Conference.

"Folk is as short as it is blissful. It gracefully bows to tradition. Sofia Talvik captivates the listeners with the soul and emotions of these folk songs. The Swede is one of those singer-songwriters who turns everything she touches into gold."

Lie In The Sound

April 2015, Sofia's sixth studio album, *Big Sky Country*, was released. A storybook of adventures and hardships, about sometimes doubting

yourself but also finding strength within yourself. Ten original songs written on the road as well as in the contemplation after, beautifully packaged in a simple yet powerful production. Big Sky Country also contains a cover of Starwalker by **Buffy Sainte-**Marie. The album was appointed fourth best Americana album of the year by the **United Kingdom** newspaper The Telegraph.

The latest album, Paws of a Bear, released in 2019, gained a lot of critical acclaim in both the United States and Europe, charting on the top lists of the United States Folk Radio, Roots Music Report, and Euro Americana Charts. The first single, Take Me Home, stayed in the top ten of the United States Folk Radio charts for several months. Many of the songs of the album are on the theme of home and identity.

# San Diego Contra Dance

Contra dancing is a form of North American folk dance. Dancers start in sets of two parallel lines that run the length of the hall and do a sequence of moves with couples progressing up or down the set. Many of the basic figures are similar to figures in square dancing.

Contra dancing is easy for beginners to learn, and the half-hour beginners' session before our dances will teach you most of what you need to dance the entire evening.

We dance to live music and recommend comfortable clothing and soft-soled shoes. As a modern dance form, there are no limits on who can dance as partners. You need not bring a partner with you.

Our current schedule, pandemics willing, is to dance on the first Saturday of each month from 7:30 to 10pm with a beginners' session at 7. Our dances are at the Dorothea Laub Dance Place in Liberty Station at 2650 Truxtun Road in a second floor studio. We ask that you pay whatever feels like the right amount from \$10 to \$25.
